*The greatness of a community is most accurately measured by the compassionate actions of its members, a heart of grace, and a soul generated by love. Coretta Scott King*

I found this quote from Coretta Scott King a while back and I have been keeping it near me, posted on my desk, as I do when I find quotes that speak to me, so I can meditate and ponder what it is saying to me. The words *compassionate actions* have been wafting over me. That word compassion drew me to a book I have been hearing a lot about lately from parishioners, colleagues, and friends. The book is titled *Twelve Steps to a Compassionate Life*, by Karen Armstrong. It is a lovely book, well worth exploring and slowly tasting, perhaps over this month of August. There will be two copies of the book available in the library beginning in August for those interested in a deeper look.

Karen Armstrong tells us that the word compassion often is interpreted to mean pity, but instead she points out that the word comes from the Latin word *patiri* and the Greek *pathenian*, which means to suffer, undergo, or experience. So “compassion” means “to endure [something] with another person,” to put ourselves in somebody else’s shoes, to feel her pain as though it were our own, and to enter generously into his point of view\*.

As we walk into August, which almost immediately begins (Aug. 3<sup>rd</sup>) with our Just Soup first anniversary, I can’t help thinking how appropriate this book is for this time. We will be celebrating a year of being in compassion with all of our neighbors as we have opened wide our parish hall doors every Wednesday for anyone who comes in. We have been present and have experienced with each other different perspectives and ways of being and living. We have felt each other’s pain and joys as we have cooked together, served alongside each other, and sat at table together sharing a meal and a conversation. We have and continue to make new friends and new ways of being together in community. It sounds like compassion to me, saints of St. Paul’s, and it also sounds like the gospel.

I hope you will join us for the Just Soup anniversary beginning at 11:30 am on August 3<sup>rd</sup>. We will be having hamburgers, veggie burgers, and hot dogs, and even better, ice cream and rice cream! Please sign up in the parish hall if you can attend or call the church office.

Our newest acolyte is new to St. Paul's. Lexis Ritter has held this position for only a few months and takes her job very seriously. Nine-year old Lexie, as she's called, likes being a participant, not just a spectator. So seriously does she take her hour near the action that she listens very carefully to the two readings, the Gospel and the homily. And she doesn't forget all that she's been immersed in for those minutes. When she gets home, she shares it with her stuffed animals and pets. "A little while ago she told me that she didn't want to read from an intermediate Bible anymore," says her mother Laurabelle. "That's just stories, Mom. I want the real thing to read, like in church." So, with her new bible in hand, Lexis lines up Zoë her dog, Brit and Gabby her cats, and her collection of stuffed animals and preaches, quoting the scriptures.



The family is, although new to St. Paul's, not new to Northwest Washington. Mike was born in Orange, California, and raised in Poulsbo, Laurabelle in Shelton. In 2000 they moved from Kingston to Quilcene and soon were on their quest for the church that would meet their spiritual needs.

"I was baptized in the Lutheran Church," Mike says, "but my mother actually went to an Episcopal Church, St. Charles' in Poulsbo." He added that the other side of the family were LDS Mormons. Laurabelle's family were not churchgoers. How lucky we all are that their search ended when they found St. Paul's last winter.

This is a busy family, all seemingly going in different directions.

Lexie is a third grader at the Poulsbo Adventist School, a small Christian school not far from her mother's office. "We thought it better that I make the school runs and be close to her school, rather than Lexis taking a bus to a school that's 40 minutes from my office." A nice dividend of this arrangement is that the two of them have more precious mother-daughter time.

Laurabelle, an architectural designer with a degree in computer drafting, is employed by Terhune Custom Homes in Poulsbo. She says that she has thousands of designs to her credit. "It is so very satisfying to help folks realize their dream home, to work with them on the design and to see them through the building process." Our own Joe Nuber lives in a house that Laurabelle helped design.

However, all Lexie's friends and their parents think that Laurabelle is a professional baker. "I make cupcakes for every function at the school, and the parents keep asking about my bakery. I think it's just because none of them have ever seen or used a piping bag." Those of you who were at the Pentecost potluck luncheon might have had a piece of her blueberry tart. It didn't last long. Lexie, who loves to help Laurabelle in the kitchen, helped with this delicious creation. What a team they are and how lucky Lexie is to be attached to those apron strings.

Mike is a phlebotomist. Or, to the layman, he's one of the men in the white coat in the lab at Jefferson Healthcare who draws blood for blood tests. This was not his first career choice. "I was an Emergency Medical Technician," he told us. "But I threw my shoulder out, and after the surgery to fix it I couldn't do my job properly anymore." Wanting to stay in the health field, Mike went back to school and is now licensed phlebotomist. Working mostly in the main lab and in the emergency room, Mike is very enthusiastic about our hospital. "The staff is like family, and although it's only a 25-bed hospital, we are very lucky to have the caliber of doctors and staff that we have."

Together this charming but very busy small family bikes, hikes, and gardens. When the time allows, Mike and Laurabelle hope to follow their daughter's lead and become more involved in St. Paul's. Hopefully, a mother-daughter contribution to the Bake Shoppe at the next St. Nicholas Faire will be only the beginning.

Separate bulletins are prepared for both Sunday services. 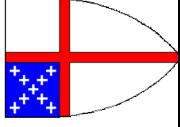

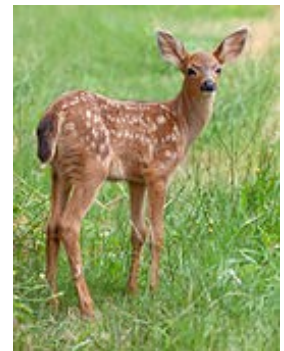
## OF HUMAN INTEREST

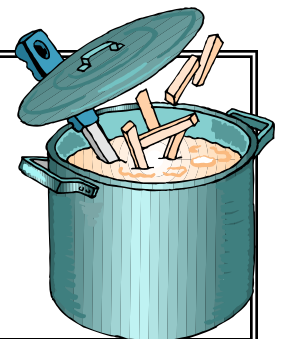

**NEWS FROM THE FOOD BANK**



As I write this I have just returned from our Wednesday PT Food Bank, where food, wild stories, and light-heartedness are plentiful.

I sat with Shirley Moss (director) as we talked over our new fund raising strategies for our warehouse fork lift, terribly needed, as the other is worn out and dangerous.

Shirley calls in the order for FOOD LIFE LINE early Friday mornings. They deliver on Tuesday for our Wednesday distribution. This past order was rich with dairy, frozen vegetarian pastas, jams, vitamins, and quality canned foods. We are now paying 3 cents a lb. for the entire order, an unbelievable value.

We want all to know that every item put in our weekly basket is valued! That said, we ask that donors not go out of their way to purchase food for the food bank. At this point no one can beat the prices we are paying, and therefore, monetary donations can go much further.

If you have any questions, please feel free to give me a call. And please, please know that the 35 to 40 pounds of food donations weekly from our small church have been a lifesaver over many, many years. This generosity is received with gratitude and recognition!

### **THE BISHOP'S COMMITTEE FOR THE ENVIRONMENT**

With the matching \$350 grant we will purchase LED exit signs for the three buildings on our campus, the church, Fenn House, and Judy House, that currently don't have them ( these signs are required by the city). We'll also be purchasing CFLs (compact fluorescent light bulbs) to replace as many existing incandescent bulbs as possible.

All of this will help to reduce our annual electricity bill AND reduce our carbon footprint!

### **OUR GREEN BELL**

We do not yet have figures showing what we save by going online with the Bell, but here are a few stray facts: Bells run 12 to 16 pages. Our Ricoh printer is fantastic, collating and stapling as well as printing, but there is a per-page charge for each page printed, and the price goes up phenomenally for color. If one page is printed in color, the whole document is charged as for color—that is, as if all 12 or 16 pages were in color. Paper and toner are not cheap. We use three sheets of 11x17 paper for a 12-pager, four for 16 pages. If content adds up to, say, 13 or 14 pages, we must go to 16 pages. The printer cannot handle partial sheets.

We must have a minimum of 200 items to earn bulk rate and bulk rates just went up. Mailing paper copies first class runs 44 cents each for 12-page issues, 64 cents for 16-pagers, and break-even is somewhere around 40 copies. We mail about a dozen. If the post office has too much first-class mail, it puts bulk rate items aside until it has time to process them; thus, the Bell may sit in the post office for several days, although that is not the only reason the Bell is late at times. These and other factors enter into the cost equation.

There are two bottom lines: 1) what is the actual cost to the church and to the environment? and 2) what do our members gain? If members lose, all bets are off; parishioners come first. But there are several very nice little perquisites for members. For one, we can incorporate color wherever we wish without cost; for example, the Pentecost photos, so wildly wonderful in flaming color, as well as the Fat Tuesday gaudiness, are now free. The Bell can be in hand without fail before the first of the month, even if the post office dawdles or last-minute items push the deadline to month's end. Best of all, the parishioner's donation dollar is stretched farther.

But St. Paul's itself comes out ahead. Despite our award as a leader in conservation (thank you, Greening Task Force), we were for a while the only church in the area who still mailed pounds of paper every month. We enjoy great community respect. In order to maintain that respected voice promoting Jesus Christ and His ministries, we should be on the forefront of conservation efforts, especially in eco-conscious Port Townsend. That means using email for the Bell, among other steps we take.
